## LIVING OFF CAMPUS: GUIDE TO RENTING AND LEASING

## STEP 1: <br> KNOW YOUR BUDGET

Before you begin your search process, do some research and create a budget for yourself. Costs to consider include:

- Rent: A good rule of thumb is to put no more than 30 percent of your monthly income toward rent.
- Security deposit and move-in fees: Some apartments will require these fees. As you begin your search, seek out what these fees look like at various properties.
- Utilities: Your monthly rent might not include utilities. If utilities are not included in rent, you will need to budget for Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) and Metropolitan Utilities District (MUD).
- Laundry: Learn how much laundry costs and whether the machines are in your unit, within the property, or not on the property at all.
- Parking: If you own a vehicle, check to see if the property chrages for a parking spot.
- Food and groceries: If you have had a meal plan for the past two years and do not plan on purchasing one while living off campus, be sure to budget for grocery money.


## STEP 3:

SELECT YOUR LIVING SPACE
Use your budget to narrow your property search.
Once you select a few properties that you are interested in, consider:

- How much space will you need?
- What amenities do you want?
- How close to campus do you want to be?


## STEP 2:

## ESTABLISH YOUR TIMELINE

If you're looking to live in a house with other people, note that:

- Creighton students typically begin searching for housing in October
- Students typically sign leases in December
- Leases often begin on June 1, but before you sign the lease, talk with the property manager/landlord about when you can move in
If you're looking to live in an apartment:
- Begin your research between October-Decemeber
- Take apartment tours in January-February
- Communicate early and often with the apartment manager about your intended move-in date


## STEP 4:

REVIEW YOUR LEASE
Complete a walkthrough and review the details of the lease. Make sure that all occupants sign the lease. Be sure to look for things like:

- Lease commitment and number of occupants
- Rent amount ans security deposit
- Utilities
- Repairs
- Pets
- Extended leave
- Furnishings and appliances
