WHO IS A COMMUTER STUDENT?

If you live off campus at any point during your time at Creighton, you are considered a commuter student! Whether you have never lived on campus, you are a student who has completed their residency requirement, or a graduate/professional student, you are considered to be a commuter.

WHAT IS SUSTAINABLE COMMUTING?

Transportation accounted for 28% of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions in 2018—greenhouse gas emissions are the number one contributor to climate change. Challenge yourself to become a more sustainable commuter by traveling to and from campus via low carbon and sustainable modes.

Creighton is located in the heart of a large, sprawling Midwestern urban city. Because of this, we have access to a variety of transportation options. Using sustainable modes of transportation reduces gasoline consumption and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Additionally, activities such as walking and bike riding help build a sense of community and encourage healthy lifestyles.



SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION METHODS

WALKING

Omaha is a great city for walking. At 12 blocks per mile, you can walk an Omaha block in a New York minute! To travel from campus to downtown it takes about 15 minutes walking, four minutes biking, and two minutes driving. Enter your address into **Walk Score** to see how far you can commute in a given timeframe by walking, biking, taking the bus, or driving.

CARPOOLING

Data from our 2018 Parking and Transportation survey shows that 73% of students, faculty and staff live in a zip code with 30 or more individuals who also commute to Creighton. Carpooling reduces the number of single-occupancy cars on the road and in campus parking lots. By carpooling, you are reduce our carbon footprint and improve social connections. Now that passes can be easily moved between vehicles, carpooling is more convenient!

THE OMAHA BUS SYSTEM

Omaha has a bus system that can take you all across the city. To learn more about bus routes, how to ride, and more, visit the **Omaha Metro Website**.

BIKING

There are a few hills in town, so riding your bike is a great way to get to campus while keeping up with your fitness and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Bike racks are available outside each residence hall and many other campus buildings. Check out the Creighton **bike rack map** to see where you can park your bike. To explore beyond campus, use the **Omaha Metropolitan Area Bicycle Map.** Don't have a bike? **Heartland Bcycle** has you covered! With stations near campus, you can rent bicycles and ride to popular areas of town.

Community Bike Project Omaha (CBPO) and its Earn-a-Bike program are less than a mile from campus. You can volunteer, pay a small fee for supplies, choose a bike, and refurbish it with shop mechanics. You'll have a bike to call your own and learn fundamental bicycle maintenance and repair skills.

TAXI SERVICES

ZIPCAR

Need a car? Borrow a **Zipcar**! Creighton has partnered with Zipcar to bring self-service, on-demand car sharing to the area. Simply register as a member, reserve a car online or by phone, use your Zipcard to enter the car, and drive away. Return the car to the location you picked it up.

SHUTTLE SERVICES

Creighton offers free shuttle services that stop all around campus and in the neighborhoods west of campus. Click <u>here</u> to learn more about the shuttle route and where you can catch a ride.

PARKING PERMITS

You're welcome to bring a vehicle to campus as long as you purchase a parking pass. **Student parking** is designated in green. In addition to several surface parking lots, student parking is available on Levels one and two of the 20th Street Garage, Levels two and three of the 24th Street Garage, and the bottom level of the 30th Street Garage.

University ID cards and parking permits are required for all garages. To find the annual price of a parking pass, please visit the **Public Safety website.**

Evening-only parking permits are available for no cost at Public Safety. These permits allow faculty, staff, and students to park in faculty/staff and student parking areas from 4 p.m.–6 a.m., Monday through Friday, and any time on weekends.

PERSONAL CARS AND ON-CAMPUS PARKING

MOTORCYCLE PARKING

Motorcycles may be parked near bicycle racks and do not require a permit. If you would like to park your motorcycle in a parking space, you must purchase and properly display a Creighton parking permit.


ON-CAMPUS EMPLOYMENT
